ONTARIO ENERGY BOARD NOTICE TO CUSTOMERS OF ELEXICON ENERGY INC.

Elexicon Energy Inc. has applied to recover from its customers the costs to restore electricity service following a storm event.

Elexicon Energy Inc. has applied to the Ontario Energy Board for approval to recover from its customers the costs to restore electricity service following a storm that occurred on May 21, 2022. Elexicon Energy Inc. states that the storm caused damage to its distribution system and resulted in 95,000 customers to be without power. Elexicon Energy Inc. is proposing to recover the costs using charges that will be applied to customer bills beginning in July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2028. If the application is approved as filed, a typical residential customer and a typical general service customer of Elexicon Energy Inc. in each of the rate zones would see the following charges on their electricity bill:

Veridian Rate Zone

- Residential customers (750 kW) would see a charge of \$0.25 per month on their electricity bill from July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024, and a charge of \$0.14 per month from July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2028
- General Service (less than 50kW) customers would see a charge of \$0.64 per month on their electricity bill from July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024, and a charge of \$0.35 per month from July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2028

Whitby Rate Zone

- Residential customers (750 kW) would see a charge of \$0.16 per month on their electricity bill from July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024, and a charge of \$0.09 per month from July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2028
- General Service (less than 50kW) customers would see a charge of \$0.46 per month on their electricity bill from July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024, and a charge of \$0.26 per month from July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2028

Other customers, including businesses, may also be affected.

THE ONTARIO ENERGY BOARD WILL HOLD A PUBLIC HEARING

The Ontario Energy Board (OEB) will hold a public hearing to consider Elexicon Energy's application. During the hearing, which could be an oral, written or electronic hearing, we will question Elexicon Energy on the case. We will also hear questions and arguments from individuals that have registered to participate (called intervenors). At the end of this hearing, the OEB will decide whether to approve the application.

The OEB is an independent and impartial public agency. We make decisions that serve the public interest. Our goal is to promote a financially viable and efficient energy sector that provides you with reliable energy services at a reasonable cost.

BE INFORMED AND HAVE YOUR SAY

You have the right to information regarding this application and to be involved in the process.

- You can review Elexicon Energy's application on the OEB's website now
- You can file a letter with your comments, which will be considered during the hearing
- You can become an intervenor. As an intervenor you can ask questions about Elexicon Energy's
 application and make arguments on whether the OEB should approve Elexicon Energy's request.
 Apply by February 7, 2023 or the hearing will go ahead without you and you will not receive any
 further notice of the proceeding
- At the end of the process, review the OEB's decision and its reasons on our website
